



What are Accessibility Tools?

Chromebooks come with a variety of built-in accessibility features that you can use to make your students' interactions with their devices more engaging. While you will know best how to address your students' learning needs, these features may be helpful for students who are low-vision or blind, deaf or hard-of-hearing, have limited range of motion or motor function, or have reading and comprehension challenges.

What Accessibility Tools are available on my Student Chromebook?

High Contrast Mode turns your desktop into a “photo negative” of the standard display. In many cases, the increase of contrast between text, objects and backgrounds can make it easier to read and cause less strain on the eyes.

Docked Magnifier – where the top third of the screen shows a magnified version of the main section below.

Highlight Mouse – You can add a red halo around your mouse pointer whenever it moves to make it easier to see.

Select-to-Speak allows you choose text and/or other items on the screen and have them read aloud using the in-built screen reader technology.

On-Screen Keyboard enables you to enter text and activate keyboard shortcuts using your mouse, trackpad or other input devices.
