Purpose and Details of the Study

Identifying the priorities of a school district requires input from several stakeholders. Rockbridge County Public Schools (RCPS) asked parents, community members, business owners, employees, and high school students for feedback on the mission statement, whether the division is meeting its mission and goals, whether the division's goals are the right ones, the level of support for current (and proposed) division programs and initiatives, what in RCPS makes them most proud, proposed priorities and goals, and areas of strength and improvement.

Results will inform the school board and division committees in the creation of the new comprehensive plan.

To ensure content validity, K12 *Insight* partnered with Superintendent Phillip Thompson and division representatives to develop the Comprehensive Plan and Priorities Survey.

The survey was open from Nov. 28 to Dec. 22.

Email invitations with unique survey links were sent to advisory council members, community members, parents/guardians, and staff. High school students used their student IDs to access the survey in school. A public link was available on the division's website, and paper surveys were also available upon request.

Pre-survey communications included a letters to principals, community members, staff members, and parents/guardians; social media posts; news brief; newsletter item; website news item, phone script, text messages, and an email/letter to literacy tutors and a program ad with a QR code.

Reminders were sent Dec. 5, 12, 19, and 21.

The survey was available in English and Spanish.



Understanding the Results

This report summarizes survey results and breaks them down by parents, employees, students, and other (business owners/representatives of nonprofit organizations, community members who do not have children in RCPS, and advisory council members).

Results do not reflect random sampling; therefore, they should not be generalized to all division stakeholders. Rather, results reflect only the perceptions and opinions of participants.

Findings for each item in the report exclude participants who did not answer. In graphs, data labels less than 5 percent are not shown. Percentages may not total 100 due to rounding.


Thematic analysis was conducted for the open-ended question on slide 32. K12 *Insight* researchers used the constant comparative analysis (CCA) technique to analyze the feedback and identify common themes. CCA is an analytical approach where all units of data are compared with all other units to discover common properties and dimensions in the data (O'Connor et. al, 2008). This technique allows researchers to develop categories and themes.


Which of the following describes you? (N=1,374)






Overall Quality of Education


How would you rate the overall quality of an RCPS education?


How strongly do you agree or disagree that RCPS is fulfilling its mission?





Clear Goals to Measure Success


How strongly do you agree or disagree that RCPS has clear goals to measure success?






Revised Mission Statement by Participant Group



Our schools will promote and provide safe, orderly, caring, and supportive environments. (N=1,354)




How strongly do you support the following division programs and initiatives?





What Makes You Proud


When thinking about RCPS, what makes you feel proud? (N=1,272)





What Makes You Proud by Participant Group


When thinking about RCPS, what makes you feel proud?










Quality of Facilities and Services by Participant Group




The school board and division leaders are considering different priorities for RCPS. How strongly do you agree or disagree that these are the right priorities for RCPS?






Future Priorities by Participant Group

The school board and division leaders are considering different priorities for RCPS. How strongly do you agree or disagree that these are the right priorities for RCPS?





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


Future Goals by Participant Group







Expansion of Digital Conversion Program



Internet Access by Participant Group


In designing and supporting instructional technology and blended learning, it is important to understand our families' technology resources. Do you have Internet access at home?

Thematic Analysis

What areas of RCPS need improvement? (N=511)

Several comments were about having **high quality teachers in the division**. Participants appeared to define "high quality" as being effective, caring, and professional. Participants suggested holding teachers accountable, continually training teachers, and removing low performers.

Several comments were about addressing the division's **building infrastructure and maintenance.** Participants noted the need to modernize buildings, address faulty equipment (e.g., HVAC equipment), and create more gym and outdoor space, as well as have more windows within school buildings. They noted that buildings are not clean or well maintained, and these buildings need to be expanded to accommodate a growing student population.

Several participants conveyed the importance of teachers being more innovative in their techniques to engage students. Suggestions offered by participants were about focusing on ways to empower students in their own education, knowing students, being innovative in delivering instruction, differentiating the instructional program to meet the diverse needs of students, implementing more inquiry-based learning techniques, being aware of the pace when conveying information, having a strong command over the material, clearly communicating information to students, and offering alternative education options.


Some comments were centered on the division providing **better compensation for employees**. Participants noted that having competitive compensation may translate into more qualified teachers wanting to teach in RCPS and higher teacher retention rates.

A few comments were related to **focusing less on standardized tests and the Standards of Learning (SOL) exams**. These participants recommended reducing the number of assessments that students are required to complete and shifting the focus to instruction.



Key Insights


- 67% of participants rated the overall quality of an RCPS education as excellent or good. Slightly fewer participants either strongly agree or agree that RCPS is fulfilling its mission (63%) and that RCPS has clear goals to measure success (57%).
- Participants are most proud of the academic program (50%), staff members and student achievement (both 47%), and the Career and Technical Education program (43%). One area of improvement the division may want to consider is improving stakeholder perception of the school meal program, bus service, communication provided by the school and division, and building quality and maintenance.
- While there is support for current programs (Advanced Placement courses, dual enrollment, etc.) and approximately three in four participants said that the revised mission (74%) and vision (76%) statements adopted by the school board represent the right direction for RCPS, less than half of participants said they believe the division has met or surpassed current goals. For example, only 21% of participants said they believe the division has either surpassed or met the goal about instructing in new ways, recognizing individual differences, and providing opportunities for different learning styles.
- Most participants agreed that the goals under consideration by the school board and division leadership are the right goals for RCPS.
- The strong majority of participants have Internet access at home (88%) and access to a digital device to complete homework (91%). When asked about their position on expanding the digital conversion program, parents (67%) and employees (62%) were the two participant groups most likely to either Strongly Support or Support this idea.
- The top five challenges that RCPS needs to address over the next five years are: Addressing school funding issues; recruiting, training, and retaining high-quality staff; increasing student achievement; preparing students for college; and expanding and improving the use of appropriate technology in classroom curricula. Participants said the top three issues facing students today are college and workplace preparation, lack of parental involvement, and a changing economy.
- Participants ranked communication skills (writing, listening, and speaking), critical thinking skills, interpersonal skills (working with others), problem-solving skills, and organizational and time management skills as the five most important skills and abilities that students will need to be successful in the future.
- Participants said the top five financial priorities for RCPS should be: Competitive salary scale geared toward high-quality teachers; recruiting, training, and retaining high-quality teachers; optimal class sizes for teaching and learning; additional courses (electives and Career and Technical Education focus); and secure, clean, modern facilities and buildings.


Which of the following best describes your affiliation as a parent of a child who currently attends school in RCPS? (N=381)





Do you reside in Rockbridge County? (N=77)




How many years have you lived in Rockbridge County? (N=61)








Which of the following best describes your race/ethnicity? (N=1,351)










Parent Participation

Which of the following grade ranges apply to your child or children? (N=384)










